THE COMMON SEAL OF THE COUNCIL

1 PURPOSE

To increase the number of officers who are authorised to witness the sealing of documents.

2 RECOMMENDATIONS

That Article 14.05(b) be amended as set out in the annexe to this report.

3 BACKGROUND

3.1 A substantial number of legal documents are "executed" under the Council's Seal.

Most of these are land transactions though certain contracts and other documents
must also be sealed. The sealing of a document must be attested by two signatories.

4 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDED COURSE OF ACTION AND OTHER OPTIONS

- 4.1 The recent review of the officers' structure had the unintentional effect of reducing the number of officers' signatories. As a result there are sometimes difficulties in securing enough signatures to seal a document at short notice.
- 4.2 It is therefore proposed that all the strategic directors are authorised to witness the Council's Seal and the necessary amendments appear in italics in the revision of Article 14.05(b) below.

APPENDICES

Revised Article 14.05(b)

The impression of the Common seal must be witnessed by (a) The Mayor or Deputy Mayor, Mayor Designate, Chief Executive, Strategic Directors, Assistant Chief Executive, Director of Resources or Acting Assistant Chief Executive (Finance) and (b) the Borough Solicitor or the Principal Solicitor or in the absence of both officers any other officer employed as and qualified as a solicitor. A record of every sealing must be entered and consecutively numbered in a book and signed by one of the witnesses to the sealing.
