(1) Winter 2023/24: To understand residents views on trees and woodland, why they are important, how they rate the tree service currently, where new tree planting should take place etc This was an online consultation, with one version for adults and a similar version for young people. The consultation was promoted via social media, posters in neighbourhood centres, parks and the town centre. It was also sent to around 150 community and voluntary organisations in the town. The young person's consultation was sent out to all schools via Stevenage Education Trust. Around 490 responses were received.
	(2) Jan – Feb 2025: To seek feedback on the draft strategy to ensure that it was easy to understand, fair and equitable, and that the actions broadly met public needs identified in earlier consultation.
	This consultation was delivered on-line with the draft strategy made available on the Council's web pages. 18 responses were received.

The aim of the strategy is to ensure that through partnership with local residents and other stakeholders we will create a bigger, well managed, more sustainable treescape; connecting trees, woodlands and hedgerows to benefit the environment, people, and wildlife now and in the future.

78% of respondents to the draft strategy felt that it was easy to understand, and 22% were uncertain.

55% of respondents felt that the strategy was fair and inclusive, while 33% were uncertain.
